<b>Lesson topic and target</b>	Law is very much a practical tool. In this class, the students will be able to learn how international legal techniques are actually used in practical settings and how you yourself are to use such international legal techniques in practical settings. The purpose of this class is to provide the students with the practical capacity to apply legal techniques in multilateral treaty negotiations. [EUIJ Subject]
<b>Syllabus and plan</b>	<p>This class will take up an actual case of multilateral treaty negotiation in which the professor was personally involved in. In the first half of the course, the students will learn the basic structure and the actual operation of multilateral treaty regimes, and drafting techniques for their negotiation. In the latter part of the course, the students will conduct a mock treaty negotiation, which will be the recreation of the actual negotiation. In this mock negotiation, each student will represent a main negotiating State. The outcome from this mock negotiation may not be the same as the real one, depending on the capabilities of the individual negotiators!</p> <p>The negotiation case that will be taken up in this class will depend upon the number of registered students and their interest, so it will be decided at the beginning of the class. In October 2011, the 10th Conference of the Parties to the Basel Convention on the Regulation of Hazardous Wastes will be held in Cartagena, Colombia, where an international legal negotiation on "Ban Amendment" will be an interesting agenda. This class may take up this issue.</p>
<b>Evaluation method and</b>	The students will be evaluated on the basis of class participation. Your active participation in the mock treaty negotiations will be evaluated

<b>baseline</b>	particularly high.
<b>Notice (include info. on related class)</b>	It is preferable that the students intending to take this class have some knowledge of international law. For example, "International Cooperation Law" provided in the fall semester of 2010 and 2011 will give you a necessary background to effectively participate in this class. Also, the students are strongly recommended to take "International Environmental Law" in Spring term of 2011.
<b>Office hour • Contact information</b>	The students may ask questions just after the class. Otherwise, the students are encouraged to make an appointment by e-mail before coming to the office.
<b>Message for student</b>	In the first half of the course, the class will be conducted in lecture style, using both English and Japanese. The discussion during the class is strongly encouraged. In the latter half of the course, the mock multilateral treaty negotiation is conducted mostly in English. However, the instructor may explain some English technical phrases in Japanese so that the Japanese students may be able to understand them. The basic reading materials and documents for mock negotiation will be provided in the class, and they are mostly in English.
<b>Improvements in Teaching</b>	It is planned that an international fieldwork to Cartagena, Colombia in October 2011 to attend the COP10 of the Basel Convention will be an important part of this class.
<b>Text</b>	The necessary materials will be distributed during the class.
